SHORTCUTS ARE A CHOICE

Employees will take shortcuts on the job for many different reasons. As business owners and safety professionals we need to realize this is an individual choice and take precautions to eliminate the behavior.

Taking a shortcut can show itself in different ways, the following are just some examples of shortcuts employees take:

A pet peeve for most (if not all) safety professionals is employees not wearing Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) properly or at all. PPE is treated as a last line of defense for safety of employees when Outsourcing, Administrative and Engineering Controls are not enough, and is issued for a reason.

Another item neglected at times is safety guarding. When machine guarding is removed for set-up, clean-up or maintenance and not replaced properly an employee is putting themselves and their co-workers at risk. The machine guarding is there as a first line of defense for the employee. Machine Guarding is an Engineering Control, these types of safety fixes are always preferred to PPE.

Rushing through a task is also a very common shortcut employees find themselves doing on a regular basis. This rush causes stress, anxiety and plenty of opportunity to miss your mark. Rushing can cause employees to experience ergonomic issues as well.

HOW CAN WE COMBAT SHORTCUTS?

Encourage employees to hold themselves to a higher standard. It is too easy to be average and take shortcuts and extra time should always be taken to secure their safety. Doing things properly needs to be a habit that all employees subscribe to.

It is crucial also, that management and safety professionals themselves do not take any shortcuts. Not following your own safety rules will make it impossible to enforce them in the future.

Emphasize how a shortcut will affect the next employee. Not fixing a tool properly or leaving an unfit workspace can cause the next user to seriously hurt themselves.

One of the more common reasons given at our facility for shortcuts is time. Ask your employees to think whether this time crunch was pressure from management or self-imposed. In my experience, employees want to do the right thing more often than not. This desire to please their bosses or their own drive may cause them to place speed above safety.

Plan your workday out in a way that is the most efficient. You may be able to line up certain tasks in a way that promotes efficiency. Evaluate your processes on an ongoing basis to eliminate wasted time or movements that can cause time constraints to be an issue or lead to overexertion/ergonomic concerns.
